Why is this test being done?

This test is being done to find out whether your child's brain is sending signals to start puberty. It can also be done to give a doctor more information about your child's body's ability to produce sex hormones.

How is the test done?

A shot of medicine (Leuprolide) is given and then blood is drawn in the lab at specific times. Plan to spend at least 1 1/2 hours at Children's for this test.

How do I prepare my child for the test?

- Your child can eat or drink fluids as normal. Your child does not need to fast for this test.
- Bring books, toys or games for your child to use during the test.

Where do we go for the test?

Enter Children's at any Whale entrance and check in at the 6th floor Whale registration desk. GNRH tests are done in the Endocrinology clinic. Ask the greeter at the front desk to direct you to the clinic.
