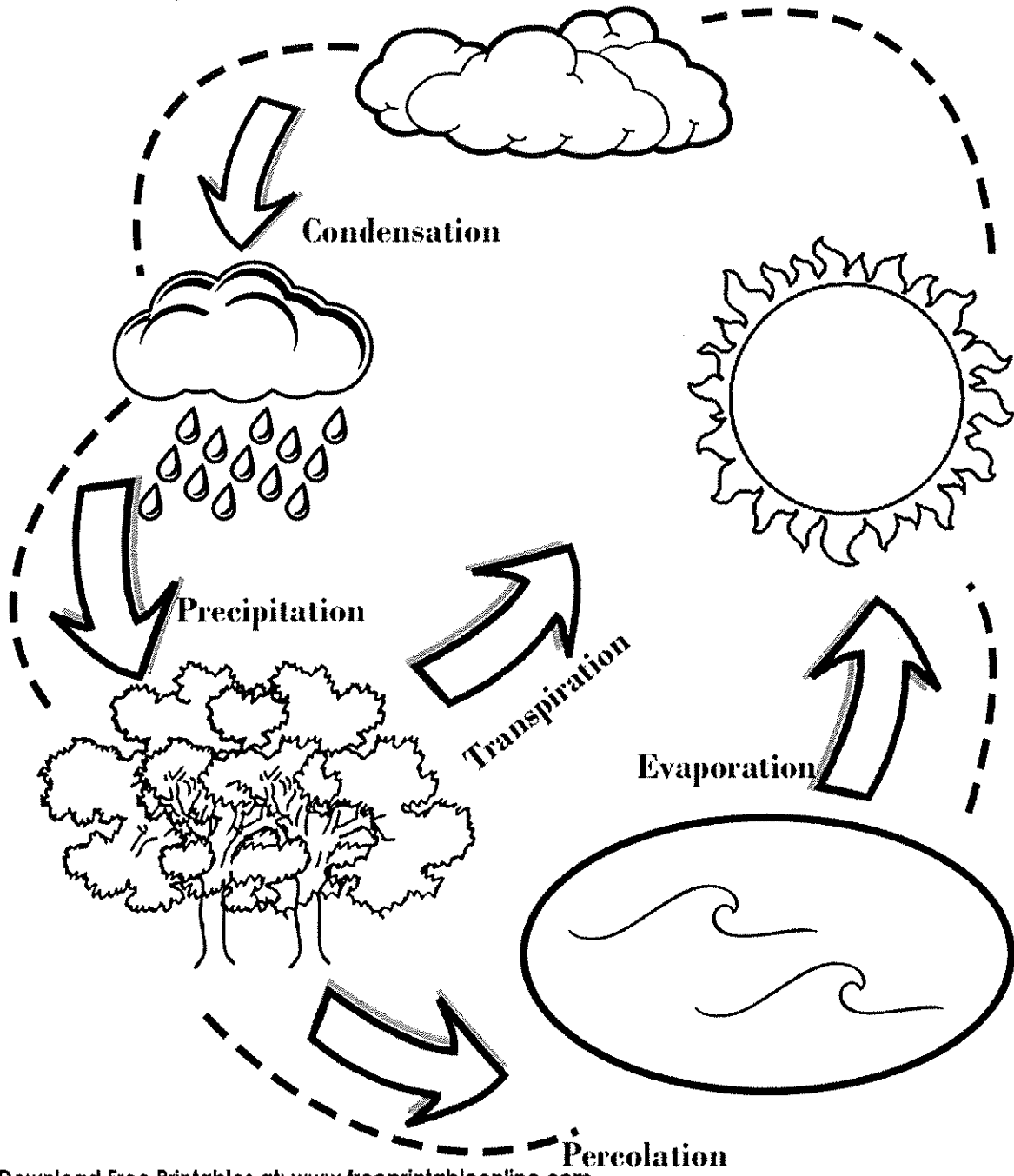

Igloo Picture

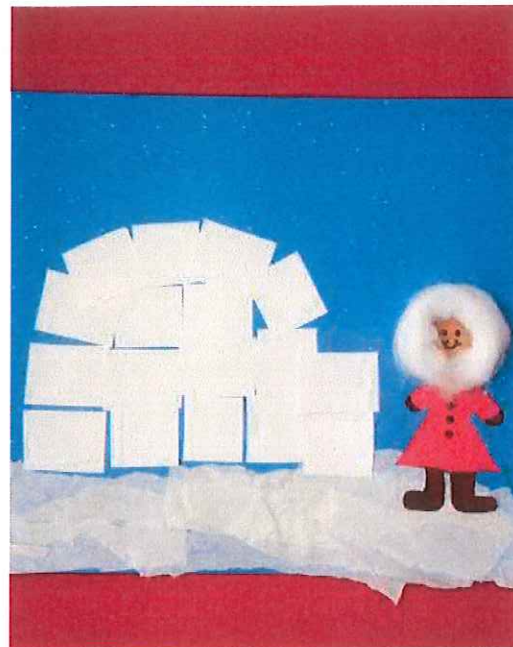
Does your child want to play in the snow, even though it's time to come inside? Here's a great activity to help him satisfy his snow play cravings in a cozy indoor setting. He can create his very own igloo! He can even include an Eskimo, wearing a warm coat complete with a hood made from fuzzy cotton!

What You Need:

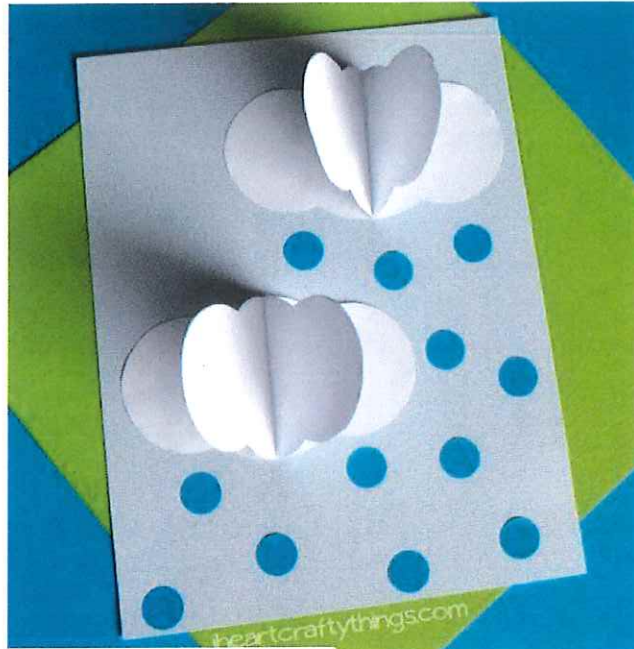
- Construction paper in various colors
- Tissue paper
- Scissors
- Pencil
- Markers
- Glue stick

What You Do:

1. Lay a sheet of blue paper on the table in a landscape, or horizontal position.
2. Ask your child to use the scissors to cut out small rectangular shapes to create the blocks of ice.
3. Have him tear long strips of tissue paper to create an icy terrain, where the igloo will be built.
4. Encourage him to glue the "ice" tissue paper to the bottom of the page, positioning the strips horizontally. Overlap them to get a more ice-like appearance.
5. Have him start setting out the ice blocks in the shape of the igloo. There are two main shapes to the igloo; the first shape resembles a large circle with a flat bottom, and the second shape is an upright oval with a flat bottom created as the entrance to the icy home.
6. Glue the ice blocks down to finish the igloo.
7. Hand him the construction paper and have him cut out a circle for the Eskimo's face, and an outfit for him to wear in the cold weather. Make sure he includes a hat!
8. Add the "fur" lining to the front of the hat by unrolling a cotton ball and separating a small piece of it from the rest of the ball. Glue it in a circular line around the face of the Eskimo to complete the wintry look.

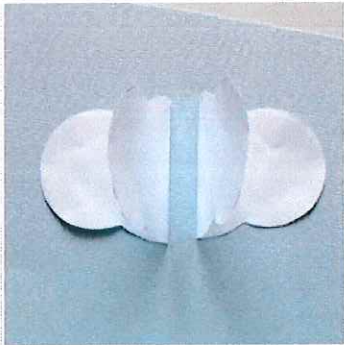


How to make 3D Clouds

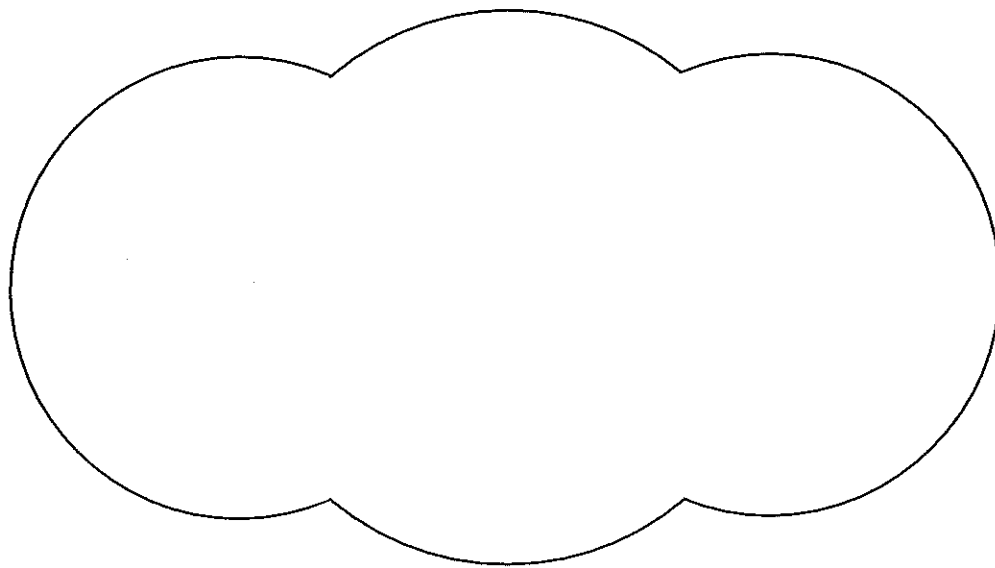
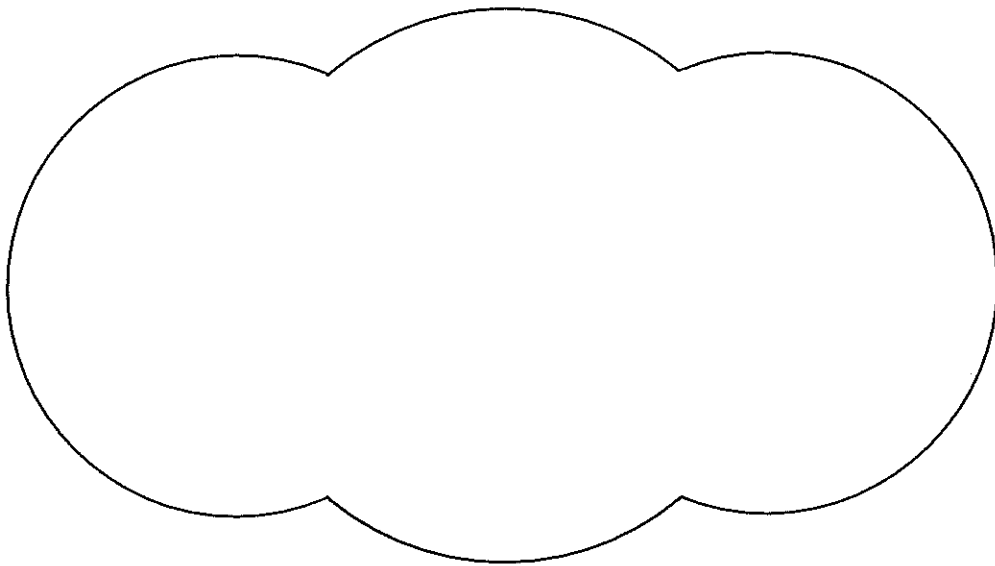
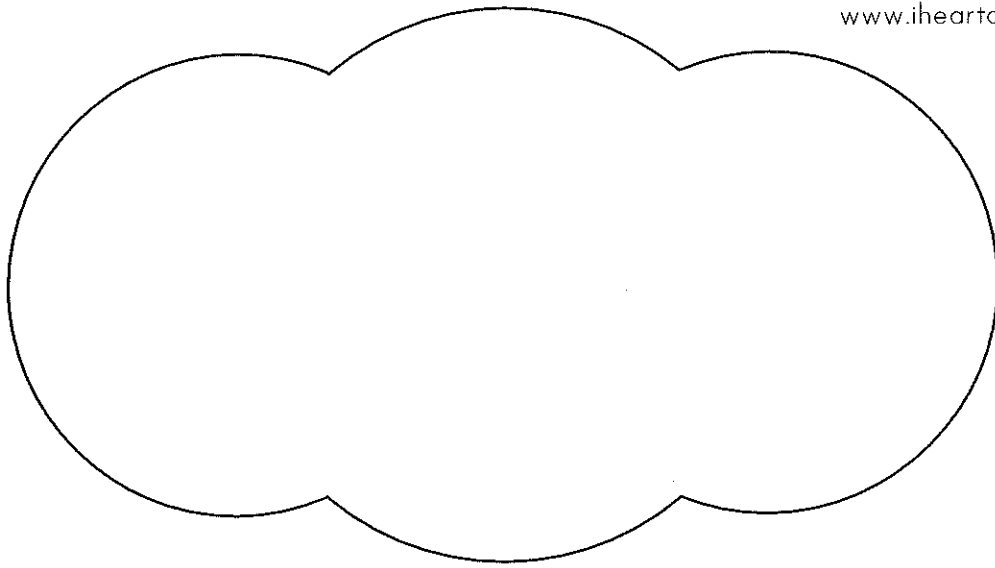


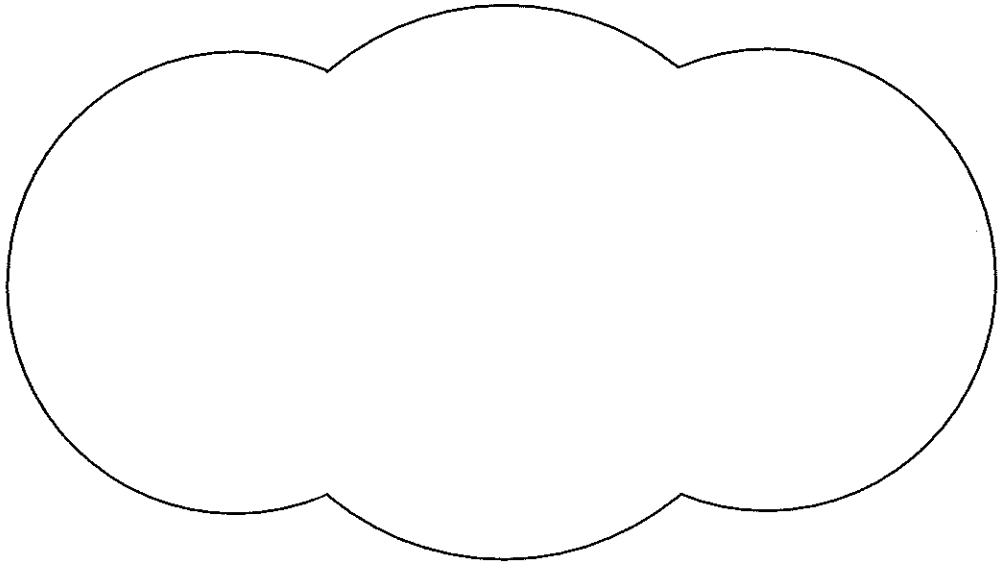
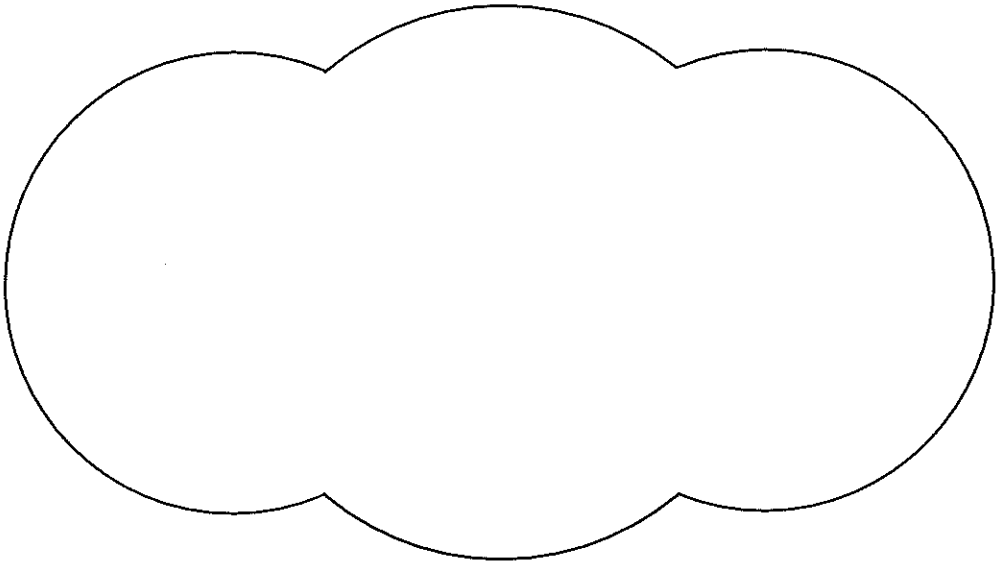
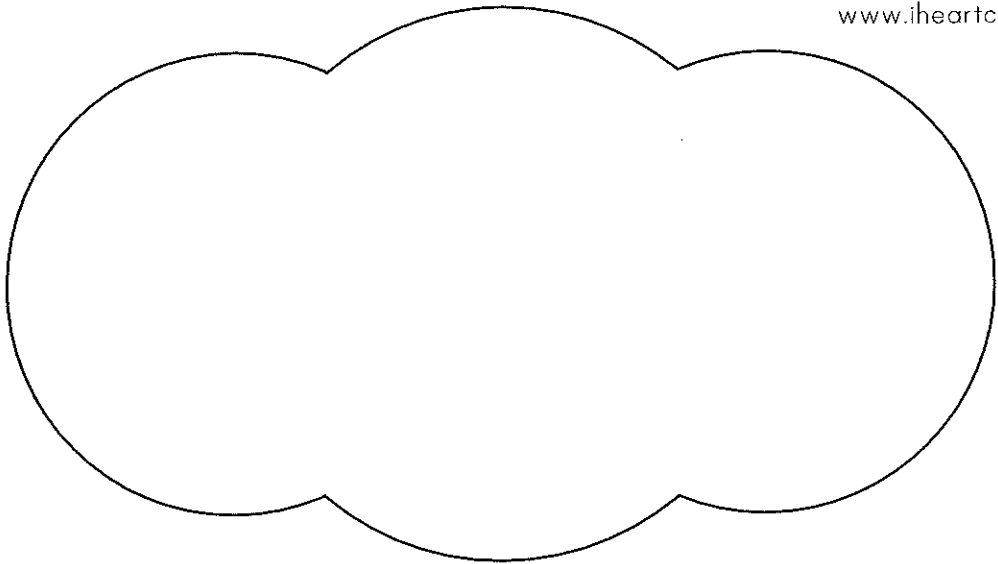
Instructions:

1. Start by cutting out all of the clouds from the the rain clouds printable.
2. Fold all the clouds in half.
3. Take 2 pieces and face them opposite each other.



4. Add glue to one side and glue 2 pieces together.
5. Glue on one more cloud piece to the one you just connected. (each cloud has 3 pieces)
6. Glue your clouds to your construction paper.
7. Add rain drops with crayons.





Cotton Ball Clouds Activity for Preschool

(Book Recommendation to accompany this activity: Clouds by Anne Rockwell)

Instructions:

Draw grass and trees at the bottom of your blue paper. Use cotton balls to make each type of cloud in the sky and glue them onto your blue paper with school glue. You may wish to use gray paint to add details to some of your clouds.

Cut out each label below and glue them onto your different types of cotton ball clouds.

Make a Rainy Day Card



Directions:

- 1) Fold a piece of white paper in half.
- 2) Create an umbrella using a different color. Cut the paper in half if it is a full sheet and fold it like an accordion.
- 3) Glue one end on one side of the paper and the second end to the other side. (See photo)
- 4) Draw a handle
- 5) Draw yourself under the umbrella holding the handle.
- 6) Add googly eyes to your face with glue.
- 7) Draw the rain using crayons.
