Martine Lappé is a medical sociologist with expertise in biomedical ethics. She holds a PhD in sociology from the University of California, San Francisco, and is currently a fellow in Columbia University's Center for Research on Ethical, Legal and Social Implications of Psychiatric, Neurologic and Behavioral Genetics. Dr. Lappé has held positions in the UCLA Institute for Society and Genetics, Stanford Center for Biomedical Ethics, and the University of California, Davis Department of Science and Technology Studies.

Her research focuses on the intersections of lived experience and expert knowledge related to health, science, and medicine. She is currently completing a book titled *Anticipating Autism: Science, Uncertainty, and Care in the Post-Genomic Era*, and has several ongoing projects that explore the social and ethical implications of environmental epigenetics. Dr. Lappé has taught courses in the sociology of health and illness, science and technology studies, gender studies, and qualitative research methods. Her scholarship appears in the journals *New Genetics & Society*, *BioSocieties*, *Social Studies of Science*, *Journal of Medical Ethics*, and in the books *Achieving Justice in Genomic Translation: Rethinking the Pathway to Benefit* and *Advances in Medical Sociology: Genetics, Health and Society*.
